PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT CITY OF COSTA MESA

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 1st day of October, 2013 ("Effective Date"), by and between the CITY OF COSTA MESA, a municipal corporation ("City"), and Scientific Resource Survey (SRS), a California Incorporation ("Consultant").

WITNESSETH:

- A. WHEREAS, City proposes to utilize the services of Consultant as an independent contractor to provide on-call professional to provide the City with Cultural Resource Assessment work specific for Fairview Park as more fully described in Consultant's Proposal attached as Exhibit "A"; and
- B. WHEREAS, Consultant represents that it has that degree of specialized expertise contemplated within California Government Code, Section 37103, and holds all necessary licenses to practice and perform the services herein contemplated; and
- C. WHEREAS, City and Consultant desire to contract for the specific services described in Exhibit "A" (the "Project") and desire to set forth their rights, duties and liabilities in connection with the services to be performed; and
- D. WHEREAS, no participating official or employee of City has a financial interest, within the provisions of California Government Code, Sections 1090-1092, in the subject matter of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1.0. SERVICES PROVIDED BY CONSULTANT

- 1.1. <u>Scope of Services</u>. Consultant shall provide the professional services described in Consultant's Proposal, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 1.2. <u>Professional Practices</u>. All professional services to be provided by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall be provided by personnel experienced in their respective fields and in a manner consistent with the standards of care, diligence and skill ordinarily exercised by professional consultants in similar fields and circumstances in accordance with sound professional practices. It is understood that in the exercise of every aspect of its role, within the scope of work, consultant will be representing the City of Costa Mesa, and all of its actions, communications, or other work, during its employment, under this contract is under the direction of the affected department of the City. Consultant also warrants that it is familiar with all laws that may affect its performance of this Agreement and shall advise City of any changes in any laws that may affect Consultant's performance of this Agreement.
- 1.3. <u>Performance to Satisfaction of City</u>. Consultant agrees to perform all the work to the complete satisfaction of the City and within the time hereinafter specified. Evaluations of the work will be done by the City Representative or his or her designee. If the quality of work is not

satisfactory, City in its discretion has the right to:

- (a) Meet with Consultant to review the quality of the work and resolve the matters of concern;
- (b) Require Consultant to repeat the work at no additional fee until it is satisfactory; and/or
- (c) Terminate the Agreement as hereinafter set forth.
- 1.4. Warranty. Consultant warrants that it shall perform the services required by this Agreement in compliance with all applicable Federal and California employment laws including, but not limited to, those laws related to minimum hours and wages; occupational health and safety; fair employment and employment practices; workers' compensation insurance and safety in employment; and all other Federal, State and local laws and ordinances applicable to the services required under this Agreement. Consultant shall indemnify and hold harmless City from and against all claims, demands, payments, suits, actions, proceedings, and judgments of every nature and description including attorneys' fees and costs, presented, brought, or recovered against City for, or on account of any liability under any of the above-mentioned laws, which may be incurred by reason of Consultant's performance under this Agreement.
- 1.5. <u>Non-discrimination</u>. In performing this Agreement, Consultant shall not engage in, nor permit its agents to engage in, discrimination in employment of persons because of their race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, age, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, sexual gender or sexual orientation, except as permitted pursuant to Section 12940 of the Government Code. Violation of this provision may result in the imposition of penalties referred to in Labor Code, Section 1735.
- 1.6. <u>Non-Exclusive Agreement</u>. Consultant acknowledges that City may enter into agreements with other consultants for services similar to the services that are subject to this Agreement or may have its own employees perform services similar to those services contemplated by this Agreement.
- 1.7. <u>Delegation and Assignment</u>. This is a personal service contract, and the duties set forth herein shall not be delegated or assigned to any person or entity without the prior written consent of City. Consultant may engage a subcontractor(s) as permitted by law and may employ other personnel to perform services contemplated by this Agreement at Consultant's sole cost and expense.
- 1.8. <u>Confidentiality</u>. Employees of Consultant in the course of their duties may have access to financial, accounting, statistical, and personnel data of private individuals and employees of City. Consultant covenants that all confidential data, documents, discussion, or other information developed or received by Consultant or provided for performance of this Agreement shall not be disclosed by Consultant without written authorization by City. City shall grant such authorization if disclosure is required by law. All City data shall be returned to City upon the termination of this Agreement. Consultant's covenant under this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

2.0. COMPENSATION AND BILLING

- 2.1. <u>Compensation</u>. As compensation for the provision of services outlined in Exhibit "A" and in accordance with this Agreement, City shall pay Consultant the amounts specified in Exhibit "A" but not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00).
- 2.2. <u>Additional Services</u>. Consultant shall not receive compensation for any services provided outside the scope of services specified in the Consultant's Proposal or in an amount exceeding \$50,000.00 unless the City or the Project Manager for this Project, prior to Consultant performing the additional services, approves such additional services in writing. It is specifically understood that oral requests and/or approvals of such additional services or additional compensation shall be barred and are unenforceable.
- 2.3. Method of Billing. Consultant may submit invoices to City Project Manager for approval on a progress basis, but no more often than two times a month. Said invoice shall be based on the total of all Consultant's services which have been completed to City's sole satisfaction as of the date the invoice is created. City shall pay Consultant's invoice within forty-five (45) days from the date City receives said invoice. Each invoice shall describe in detail, the services performed, the date of performance, and the associated time for completion. Any additional services approved and performed pursuant to this Agreement shall be designated as "Additional Services" and shall identify the number of the authorized change order, where applicable, on all invoices.
- 2.4. Records and Audits. Records of Consultant's services relating to this Agreement shall be maintained in accordance with generally recognized accounting principles and shall be made available to City or its Project Manager for inspection and/or audit at mutually convenient times for a period of three (3) years from the Effective Date.

3.0. TIME OF PERFORMANCE

- 3.1. <u>Commencement and Completion of Work</u>. The professional services to be performed pursuant to this Agreement shall commence within five (5) days from the Effective Date of this Agreement.
- 3.2. Excusable Delays. Neither party shall be responsible for delays or lack of performance resulting from acts beyond the reasonable control of the party or parties. Such acts shall include, but not be limited to, acts of God, fire, strikes, material shortages, compliance with laws or regulations, riots, acts of war, or any other conditions beyond the reasonable control of a party.

4.0. TERM AND TERMINATION

- 4.1. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and continue for a period of 24 months ending on October 1, 2015, unless previously terminated as provided herein or as otherwise agreed to in writing by the parties.
- 4.2. <u>Notice of Termination</u>. The City reserves and has the right and privilege of canceling, suspending or abandoning the execution of all or any part of the work contemplated

by this Agreement, with or without cause, at any time, by providing written notice to Consultant. The termination of this Agreement shall be deemed effective upon receipt of the notice of termination. In the event of such termination, Consultant shall immediately stop rendering services under this Agreement unless directed otherwise by the City.

- 4.3. <u>Compensation</u>. In the event of termination, City shall pay Consultant for reasonable costs incurred and professional services satisfactorily performed up to and including the date of City's written notice of termination. Compensation for work in progress shall be prorated as to the percentage of work completed as of the effective date of termination in accordance with the fees set forth herein. In ascertaining the professional services actually rendered hereunder up to the effective date of termination of this Agreement, consideration shall be given to both completed work and work in progress, to complete and incomplete drawings, and to other documents pertaining to the services contemplated herein whether delivered to the City or in the possession of the Consultant.
- 4.4. <u>Documents</u>. In the event of termination of this Agreement, all documents prepared by Consultant in its performance of this Agreement including, but not limited to, finished or unfinished design, development and construction documents, data studies, drawings, maps and reports, shall be delivered to the City within ten (10) days of delivery of termination notice to Consultant, at no cost to City. Any use of uncompleted documents without specific written authorization from Consultant shall be at City's sole risk and without liability or legal expense to Consultant.

5.0. INSURANCE

- 5.1. <u>Minimum Scope and Limits of Insurance</u>. Consultant shall obtain, maintain, and keep in full force and effect during the life of this Agreement all of the following minimum scope of insurance coverages with an insurance company admitted to do business in California, rated "A," Class X, or better in the most recent Best's Key Insurance Rating Guide, and approved by City:
 - (a) Commercial general liability, including premises-operations, products/completed operations, broad form property damage, blanket contractual liability, independent contractors, personal injury or bodily injury with a policy limit of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), combined single limits, per occurrence. If such insurance contains a general aggregate limit, it shall apply separately to this Agreement or shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
 - (b) Business automobile liability for owned vehicles, hired, and non-owned vehicles, with a policy limit of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), combined single limits, per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage.
 - (c) Workers' compensation insurance as required by the State of California. Consultant agrees to waive, and to obtain endorsements from its workers' compensation insurer waiving subrogation rights under its workers' compensation insurance policy against the City, its officers, agents,

- employees, and volunteers arising from work performed by Consultant for the City and to require each of its subcontractors, if any, to do likewise under their workers' compensation insurance policies.
- (d) Professional errors and omissions ("E&O") liability insurance with policy limits of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), combined single limits, per occurrence and aggregate. Architects' and engineers' coverage shall be endorsed to include contractual liability. If the policy is written as a "claims made" policy, the retroactive date shall be prior to the start of the contract work. Consultant shall obtain and maintain, said E&O liability insurance during the life of this Agreement and for three years after completion of the work hereunder.
- 5.2. <u>Endorsements</u>. The commercial general liability insurance policy and business automobile liability policy shall contain or be endorsed to contain the following provisions:
 - (a) Additional insureds: "The City of Costa Mesa and its elected and appointed boards, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers are additional insureds with respect to: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Consultant pursuant to its contract with the City; products and completed operations of the Consultant; premises owned, occupied or used by the Consultant; automobiles owned, leased, hired, or borrowed by the Consultant.."
 - (b) Notice: "Said policy shall not terminate, be suspended, or voided, nor shall it be cancelled, nor the coverage or limits reduced, until thirty (30) days after written notice is given to City.
 - (c) Other insurance: "The Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the City of Costa Mesa, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers. Any other insurance maintained by the City of Costa Mesa shall be excess and not contributing with the insurance provided by this policy."
 - Any failure to comply with the reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the City of Costa Mesa, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers.
 - (e) The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 5.3. <u>Deductible or Self Insured Retention</u>. If any of such policies provide for a deductible or self-insured retention to provide such coverage, the amount of such deductible or self-insured retention shall be approved in advance by City. No policy of insurance issued as to which the City is an additional insured shall contain a provision which requires that no insured except the named insured can satisfy any such deductible or self-insured retention.

- 5.4. <u>Certificates of Insurance</u>: Consultant shall provide to City certificates of insurance showing the insurance coverages and required endorsements described above, in a form and content approved by City, prior to performing any services under this Agreement.
- 5.5. <u>Non-limiting</u>: Nothing in this Section shall be construed as limiting in any way, the indemnification provision contained in this Agreement, or the extent to which Consultant may be held responsible for payments of damages to persons or property.

6.0. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 6.1. Entire Agreement: This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to any matter referenced herein and supersedes any and all other prior writings and oral negotiations. This Agreement may be modified only in writing, and signed by the parties in interest at the time of such modification. The terms of this Agreement shall prevail over any inconsistent provision in any other contract document appurtenant hereto, including exhibits to this Agreement.
- 6.2. <u>Representatives</u>. The City Manager or his or her designee shall be the representative of City for purposes of this Agreement and may issue all consents, approvals, directives and agreements on behalf of the City, called for by this Agreement, except as otherwise expressly provided in this Agreement.

Consultant shall designate a representative for purposes of this Agreement who shall be authorized to issue all consents, approvals, directives and agreements on behalf of Consultant called for by this Agreement, except as otherwise expressly provided in this Agreement.

6.3. <u>Project Managers</u>. City shall designate a Project Manager to work directly with Consultant in the performance of this Agreement.

Consultant shall designate a Project Manager who shall represent it and be its agent in all consultations with City during the term of this Agreement. Consultant or its Project Manager shall attend and assist in all coordination meetings called by City.

6.4. Notices: Any notices, documents, correspondence or other communications concerning this Agreement or the work hereunder may be provided by personal delivery, facsimile or mail and shall be addressed as set forth below. Such communication shall be deemed served or delivered: a) at the time of delivery if such communication is sent by personal delivery; b) at the time of transmission if such communication is sent by facsimile; and c) 48 hours after deposit in the U.S. Mail as reflected by the official U.S. postmark if such communication is sent through regular United States mail.

- 6.5. <u>Drug-free Workplace Policy</u>. Consultant shall provide a drug-free workplace by complying with all provisions set forth in City's Council Policy 100-5, attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and incorporated herein by reference. Consultant's failure to conform to the requirements set forth in Council Policy 100-5 shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement and shall be cause for immediate termination of this Agreement by City.
- 6.6. Attorneys' Fees: In the event that litigation is brought by any party in connection with this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the opposing party all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, incurred by the prevailing party in the exercise of any of its rights or remedies hereunder or the enforcement of any of the terms, conditions, or provisions hereof.
- 6.7. Governing Law: This Agreement shall be governed by and construed under the laws of the State of California without giving effect to that body of laws pertaining to conflict of laws. In the event of any legal action to enforce or interpret this Agreement, the parties hereto agree that the sole and exclusive venue shall be a court of competent jurisdiction located in Orange County, California.
- 6.8. <u>Assignment</u>: Consultant shall not voluntarily or by operation of law assign, transfer, sublet or encumber all or any part of Consultant's interest in this Agreement without City's prior written consent. Any attempted assignment, transfer, subletting or encumbrance shall be void and shall constitute a breach of this Agreement and cause for termination of this Agreement. Regardless of City's consent, no subletting or assignment shall release Consultant of Consultant's obligation to perform all other obligations to be performed by Consultant hereunder for the term of this Agreement.
- 6.9. Indemnification and Hold Harmless Consultant agrees to defend, indemnify, hold free and harmless the City, its elected officials, officers, agents and employees, at Consultant's sole expense, from and against any and all claims, actions, suits or other legal proceedings brought against the City, its elected officials, officers, agents and employees arising out of the performance of the Consultant, its employees, and/or authorized subcontractors, of the work undertaken pursuant to this Agreement. The defense obligation provided for hereunder shall apply without any advance showing of negligence or wrongdoing by the Consultant, its employees, and/or authorized subcontractors, but shall be required whenever any claim, action, complaint, or suit asserts as its basis the negligence, errors, omissions or misconduct of the Consultant, its employees, and/or authorized subcontractors, and/or whenever any claim, action, complaint or suit asserts liability against the City, its elected officials, officers, agents and employees based upon the work performed by the Consultant, its employees, and/or authorized subcontractors under this Agreement, whether or not the Consultant, its employees, and/or authorized subcontractors are specifically named or otherwise asserted to be liable.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Consultant shall not be liable for the defense or indemnification of the City for claims, actions, complaints or suits arising out of the sole active negligence or willful misconduct of the City. This provision shall supersede and replace all other indemnity provisions contained either in the City's specifications or Consultant's Proposal, which shall be of no force and effect.

- 6.10. Independent Contractor. Consultant is and shall be acting at all times as an independent contractor and not as an employee of City. Consultant shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of City or otherwise act on behalf of City as an agent. Neither City nor any of its agents shall have control over the conduct of Consultant or any of Consultant's employees, except as set forth in this Agreement. Consultant shall not, at any time, or in any manner, represent that it or any of its or employees are in any manner agents or employees of City. Consultant shall secure, at its sole expense, and be responsible for any and all payment of Income Tax, Social Security, State Disability Insurance Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, and other payroll deductions for Consultant and its officers, agents, and employees, and all business licenses, if any are required, in connection with the services to be performed hereunder. Consultant shall indemnify and hold City harmless from any and all taxes, assessments, penalties, and interest asserted against City by reason of the independent contractor relationship created by this Agreement. Consultant further agrees to indemnify and hold City harmless from any failure of Consultant to comply with the applicable worker's compensation laws. City shall have the right to offset against the amount of any fees due to Consultant under this Agreement any amount due to City from Consultant as a result of Consultant's failure to promptly pay to City any reimbursement or indemnification arising under this paragraph.
- 6.11. PERS Eligibility Indemnification. In the event that Consultant or any employee, agent, or subcontractor of Consultant providing services under this Agreement claims or is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction or the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) to be eligible for enrollment in PERS as an employee of the City, Consultant shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless City for the payment of any employee and/or employer contributions for PERS benefits on behalf of Consultant or its employees, agents, or subcontractors, as well as for the payment of any penalties and interest on such contributions, which would otherwise be the responsibility of City.

Notwithstanding any other agency, state or federal policy, rule, regulation, law or ordinance to the contrary, Consultant and any of its employees, agents, and subcontractors providing service under this Agreement shall not qualify for or become entitled to, and hereby agree to waive any claims to, any compensation, benefit, or any incident of employment by City, including but not limited to eligibility to enroll in PERS as an employee of City and entitlement to any contribution to be paid by City for employer contribution and/or employee contributions for PERS benefits.

- 6.12. <u>Cooperation</u>. In the event any claim or action is brought against City relating to Consultant's performance or services rendered under this Agreement, Consultant shall render any reasonable assistance and cooperation which City might require.
- 6.13. Ownership of Documents. All findings, reports, documents, information and data including, but not limited to, computer tapes or discs, files and tapes furnished or prepared by

Consultant or any of its subcontractors in the course of performance of this Agreement, shall be and remain the sole property of City. Consultant agrees that any such documents or information shall not be made available to any individual or organization without the prior consent of City. Any use of such documents for other projects not contemplated by this Agreement, and any use of incomplete documents, shall be at the sole risk of City and without liability or legal exposure to Consultant. City shall indemnify and hold harmless Consultant from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, arising out of or resulting from City's use of such documents for other projects not contemplated by this Agreement or use of incomplete documents furnished by Consultant. Consultant shall deliver to City any findings, reports, documents, information, data, in any form, including but not limited to, computer tapes, discs, files audio tapes or any other Project related items as requested by City or its authorized representative, at no additional cost to the City.

- 6.14. Public Records Act Disclosure: Consultant has been advised and is aware that all reports, documents, information and data including, but not limited to, computer tapes, discs or files furnished or prepared by Consultant, or any of its subcontractors, and provided to City may be subject to public disclosure as required by the California Public Records Act (California Government Code Section 6250 et. seq.). Exceptions to public disclosure may be those documents or information that qualify as trade secrets, as that term is defined in the California Government Code Section 6254.7, and of which Consultant informs City of such trade secret. The City will endeavor to maintain as confidential all information obtained by it that is designated as a trade secret. The City shall not, in any way, be liable or responsible for the disclosure of any trade secret including, without limitation, those records so marked if disclosure is deemed to be required by law or by order of the Court.
- 6.15. Conflict of Interest. Consultant and its officers, employees, associates and subconsultants, if any, will comply with all conflict of interest statutes of the State of California applicable to Consultant's services under this agreement, including, but not limited to, the Political Reform Act (Government Code Sections 81000, et seq.) and Government Code Section 1090. During the term of this Agreement, Consultant and its officers, employees, associates and subconsultants shall not, without the prior written approval of the City Representative, perform work for another person or entity for whom Consultant is not currently performing work that would require Consultant or one of its officers, employees, associates or subconsultants to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict of interest statute.
- 6.16. <u>Responsibility for Errors</u>. Consultant shall be responsible for its work and results under this Agreement. Consultant, when requested, shall furnish clarification and/or explanation as may be required by the City's representative, regarding any services rendered under this Agreement at no additional cost to City. In the event that an error or omission attributable to Consultant occurs, then Consultant shall, at no cost to City, provide all necessary design drawings, estimates and other Consultant professional services necessary to rectify and correct the matter to the sole satisfaction of City and to participate in any meeting required with regard to the correction.
- 6.17. <u>Prohibited Employment</u>. Consultant will not employ any regular employee of City while this Agreement is in effect.
 - 6.18. Order of Precedence. In the event of an inconsistency in this Agreement and any

of the attached Exhibits, the terms set forth in this Agreement shall prevail. If, and to the extent this Agreement incorporates by reference any provision of any document, such provision shall be deemed a part of this Agreement. Nevertheless, if there is any conflict among the terms and conditions of this Agreement and those of any such provision or provisions so incorporated by reference, this Agreement shall govern over the document referenced.

- 6.19. <u>Costs</u>. Each party shall bear its own costs and fees incurred in the preparation and negotiation of this Agreement and in the performance of its obligations hereunder except as expressly provided herein.
- 6.20. No Third Party Beneficiary Rights. This Agreement is entered into for the sole benefit of City and Consultant and no other parties are intended to be direct or incidental beneficiaries of this Agreement and no third party shall have any right in, under or to this Agreement.
- 6.21. <u>Headings</u>. Paragraphs and subparagraph headings contained in this Agreement are included solely for convenience and are not intended to modify, explain or to be a full or accurate description of the content thereof and shall not in any way affect the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement.
- 6.22. <u>Construction</u>. The parties have participated jointly in the negotiation and drafting of this Agreement. In the event an ambiguity or question of intent or interpretation arises with respect to this Agreement, this Agreement shall be construed as if drafted jointly by the parties and in accordance with its fair meaning. There shall be no presumption or burden of proof favoring or disfavoring any party by virtue of the authorship of any of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 6.23. <u>Amendments</u>. Only a writing executed by the parties hereto or their respective successors and assigns may amend this Agreement.
- 6.24. Waiver. The delay or failure of either party at any time to require performance or compliance by the other of any of its obligations or agreements shall in no way be deemed a waiver of those rights to require such performance or compliance. No waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless in writing and signed by a duly authorized representative of the party against whom enforcement of a waiver is sought. The waiver of any right or remedy in respect to any occurrence or event shall not be deemed a waiver of any right or remedy in respect to any other occurrence or event, nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver.
- 6.25. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable in any circumstance, such determination shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining terms and provisions hereof or of the offending provision in any other circumstance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the value of this Agreement, based upon the substantial benefit of the bargain for any party, is materially impaired, which determination made by the presiding court or arbitrator of competent jurisdiction shall be binding, then both parties agree to substitute such provision(s) through good faith negotiations.
 - 6.26. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each

of which shall be deemed an original. All counterparts shall be construed together and shall constitute one agreement.

6.27. <u>Corporate Authority</u>. The persons executing this Agreement on behalf of the parties hereto warrant that they are duly authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of said parties and that by doing so the parties hereto are formally bound to the provisions of this Agreement.

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SRS CONTROLS FOR BUDGET AND SCHEDULE

Due to simultaneous and multiple projects, SRS, Corp. has had to keep in place a *budget and schedule control system* that has worked efficiently for decades to keep projects on course. Excellent intracompany communication reduces the occurrence of mistakes, and keeps projects running smoothly and according to schedule. Over time, SRS, Corp. has established a communication plan to network employees of all responsibilities and rank.

This system includes utilizing the following administrative and research positions and tasks:

- <u>Project Award</u>: principal investigators meet and generate two "critical path charts" indicating milestones for each separate project in "real time".
 - o The *first* chart graphs academic library and records research, field research, laboratory analyses and report preparation and agency meetings.
 - o The second chart overlays financial expenditures on the research milestones.
- The <u>principal investigators</u> meet weekly to orient the library and field research and report writing based on the information presented to them by staff.
- The <u>librarian and records manager and IT specialist</u> who maintain the resources at the Corporate Office, (Orange, California) can <u>quickly</u> provide academic information as needed to any principal investigator, project manager or supervisor. The Orange corporate office hosts an archival center which is the result of 30 years of research and collection of resources that rivals and exceeds most CRM libraries. SRS resources allow the company to competitively prepare background sections of reports.
- The <u>report specialists</u> begin their work as soon as the project is awarded. These specialists include historians, ethnographers; digital archivists and graphic report layout specialists.
- The <u>business manager</u> compiles detailed aspects of the budget for each separate project; includes labor and expendables for each project on a weekly basis and reports to principal investigators and supervisors on Fridays. CONSTRUCTION MONITORING [MINIMUM 6 HOURS]

Construction Monitoring is charged at \$65.00 per hour during a normal 8-hour workday, which includes transportation to the site and portable survey equipment.

OVERTIME/ PER DIEM RATES

Overtime for eligible employees is defined as time charged to a project in excess of 8 hours per day, and any time worked on weekends or holidays, in accordance with applicable state laws. When it is necessary for an employee to be away from the office overnight as a result of a project assignment, the average per diem rate will be \$150 to \$200 in California, depending on the area services are performed, per the U.S. General Services Administration.

FIELD/ LABORATORY SERVICES

Field/ Laboratory services are charged at personnel rates plus equipment charges. Equipment rates such as field instrumentation, surveying equipment, geophysical equipment, laboratory microscopes and measuring equipment, 3-D photography and artifact scanning are contained in a separate schedule that is available on request. SRS field vehicles are charged at a rate of \$0.56 per mile per IRS quidelines.

Harrington were obtained from the Smithsonian Institution and printed, and all language tapes, music recordings and photographs that existed for these tribal groups was gathered from research institutions throughout the United States. This project included obtaining funding for transferring early wax cylinder recordings to magnetic tape. The Consortium also conducted numerous oral interviews with tribal elders, attended Native American language and culture workshops, talks, gatherings and performances.

Several early anthropologists conducted studies all along the Pacific Rim from Baja California to SE Alaska. Specifically, J.P. Harrington, H.R. Harriman, and Phillip Drucker worked and published materials from SE Alaska. J.P.Harrington recorded stories and cultural traditions, and took photographs of Klukwan Native consultants; the Harriman Expedition in 1899 produced the first language recordings of the Tlingit language on wax cylinders; and Phillip Drucker recorded cultural attributes of the Tlingit in the early 1930's for an American tribal survey for the Smithsonian Institute. All of this information is on file at the SE Alaska office of SRS Corp. including microfilm reels with a microfilm reader/printer/digitizing machine. Original descriptions of Native use areas are contained within these archives which aid in finding and identifying the archaeological sites.



24. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT AND RELEVANCE TO THIS CONTRACT (Include scope, size and cost)

Scientific Resource Surveys, Inc (SRS) has carried out multi-staged investigations over several field seasons for a 20-year period at CA-ORA-83, commonly known as the Cogged Stone Site and others on Bolsa Chica Mesa. Amateur collectors and archaeological investigations removed hundreds of mystery artifacts known as 'Cogged Stones' from this site area. In 2007 SRS recovered seven buried caches by archaeological excavations. These unique artifacts are of unknown function but have been found below the ground surface associated with other items that are known to be used for healing and special functions. This artifact was used roughly 7,500 years ago only on Bolsa Chica Mesa and surrounding site areas and Chile. South America.

Archival, historic map and aerial photograph reviews were conducted (1981-1982); 3 research designs were written for test excavations, a data recovery program and analytical studies of the hundreds of thousands of collected cultural materials (1983; 1987; 2003); 3 site surveys and 3 surface collections were carried out (1980's); and 5 subsurface excavation programs were completed (1983-4, 1986, 1990-1994, 1999-2003, 2006-2007). Grading monitoring also occurred on 3 separate occasions for archaeological, historical and paleontological remains. In addition, over 100 human bone concentrations including internments, delayed burials and reburials were removed. Several burials of specialists who produced charmstones and talisman were recovered. For example, an artifactual cache was found that may have comprised a paint/tattoo kit and buried with the tattoo specialist. A total of 3 reburials have occurred on the property and laboratory analysis is still being conducted for a fourth internment in conjunction with 6 factions of the Gabrielino and Juaneno tribal

Numerous 'depressions' were located that were roughly circular in diameter representing the remaining subsurface portion of semi-subterranean structures. At a minimum some structures would have protected burial specialists from the environment while they worked. Others were probably used for storage of raw materials, tools and ornaments in progress, and finished products. There is also evidence that ceremonial houses and areas set aside for ritualistic activities were part of the complex on Bolsa Chica Mesa. There is physical evidence of shallow, circular pits is among the architectural remains on Bolsa Chica Mesa and these have been interpreted as dance areas. Radiocarbon dating has shown that The Cogged Stone Site experienced use over a 7,700-year period that encompasses the entire Millingstone Horizon, the entire Intermediate Horizon with continued light use into the Late Prehistoric period. A total of 22 reports were written by SRS including 16 agency reports and 6 formal publications.

Special Problems: 1.] The Bolsa Chica Mesa is situated on the boundary line between two tribal groups referred to by the Spanish as Gabrielino and Juaneno. Over the 20-year period, 6 factions of these groups were assigned to the project by the Native American Heritage Commission which involved constant participation and coordination by the Principal Investigator. 2.] During grading monitoring, over 70 burlals were located outside the site perimeter requiring special procedures in order to remove these quickly before grading equipment reached the areas. Where the soil matrix was cohesive enough to hold together, the area around each burial was trenched and the burial was encased in plaster jackets making 'pods', placed on pallets and removed by a Bobcat to the field laboratory.

Project Cost, Time and Schedule Controls: Within the last 17 years approximately 10+ million dollars have been spent on the archaeological work, Native American Monitoring, and specialized mechanical equipment for this project. The project was set in phases with yearly budgets that were reviewed on a continual basis by the client. Overruns were related to unexpected burial and house pit finds requiring removal before grading could occur. SRS, Inc. has been re-hired for all 5 major phases of the project indicating project satisfaction. Final laboratory work is on-going.

In addition to several cultural resource surveys in Needles and Blythe of the Colorado Desert and extensive work at both Banning and Jacumba at the 'gateways' to the desert, SRS, Inc. has just been awarded the Ocotillo Wells SVR Ethnographic Study by the California Dept. of Parks and Recreation for a 4,000+ acre area adjacent to Anza Borrego State Park. SRS, Inc. first established a conceptual framework for ethnographic research in the early 1990's to use as a basis for collecting all existent ethnographic information for seven tribal groups in southern California [Fernandeno, Gabrielino, Serrano, Juaneno, Luiseno, Diegueno (including Kamla) and Cupenol and previously unknown materials on the Cahuilla. In order to accomplish this daunting task, SRS formed The Ethnographic Consortium that included SRS Principal Investigator, Dr. Wiley, two Native American ethnographers and six Native advisors. The Ethnographic Consortium has spent nearly 15 years compiling archaeological, ethnographic, ethnological, and historic data. The data gathering began with university and college library research across the country for books and articles related to all southern California tribal groups. All microfilm reels for the southern California tribal groups by the early 1900's ethnologist J.P. Harrington were obtained from the Smithsonian Institution and printed. In addition, all language tapes, music recordings and 900+ photographs associated with the field notes of early anthropologists Harrington, Dubois, Sparkman, Roberts, Cook, Lummis and Waterman that existed for these tribal groups was gathered from research institutions throughout the United States. These archives also include Mission Census Records for California and Arizona and Spanish Archives and translations. The Consortium further conducted numerous oral interviews with tribal elders, attended Native American language and culture workshops, talks, gatherings and performances. The results of this research have been summarized in a draft document now entitled: Áno, Áálamal, and Ancient Ancestors. At the request of SRS, Inc., Cahuilla ethnographic expert, Dr. Lowell Bean, reviewed an earlier version of this document. The document organizes this material and addresses the following: *conceptualizing territory, *defining sacred sites within those territories [e.g. shrines, pilgrimage locales], *documenting movement in space [e.g. to the shrines and pilgrimage locales; to hunting and gathering spots; relocation based on marriage patterns, etc.], *examining the relationship between the spatial natural elements and the people, *defining special people [e.g. star persona exemplified in old stories], and *using those definitions to re-examine the initial concept of territory. This conceptual framework is being used by SRS, Inc. for our Colorado Desert projects. Size: 19,000 + acres

In June 2010, at the request of the City of Victorville Department of Engineering, SRS, Inc. conducted a Phase I Cultural Resources Assessment of approximately 2.15 linear miles in the City of Victorville, San Bernardino County, California. The project site is located on the former George Air force Base, now the Southern California Logistics Airport (SCLA) and runs parallel, approximately 3.05 meters to the east, of an already installed infrastructure containing gas, water, fiber optic cable and sewer lines. The study was part of the environmental review process for the proposed East Side Electrical Infrastructure.

The project site lies in the Victor Valley, north of Phantom Street and on the southern edge of the Mojave Desert. The terrain in the project area is relatively level with an elevation between 2860 feet and 2810 feet above mean sea level (amsl).

Scientific Resource Survey, Inc. Conducted an archaeological records center search as well as a General Land Office (GLO) Patent search. Historic maps were also consulted for the information search portion of the project. The results indicated that 42 cultural resources, 8 prehistoric and 35 historical, had been identified within a one-mile radius of the linear Area of Potential Effect (APE).

While accompanied by city officials, SRS conducted a pedestrian survey of the linear APE using survey grade GPS equipment. The results of the study revealed that a number of previously recorded cultural resources located in proximity to the project site were confirmed to lay outside of the proposed project site and right-of-way boundaries. SRS, Inc. formulated and conducted a Phase I archaeological assessment and a Phase II Test and Evaluation program for submittal to the County of Riverside, as the lead agency. The proposed project involved the subdivision of Parcel Map # 35164 for the construction of two single-family residences, located on Indian Knolls Road, near the City of Temecula in Riverside County, California. The project site consisted of approximately six acres of undeveloped land, located in Section 18, T7S, R1W, as depicted on the Bachelor Mountain 7.5' USGS Topographic map. The area included a previously identified prehistoric archaeological site CA-RIV-2160.

The site had been determined to be mainly part of the Late Prehistoric/Protohistoric Period, which is described as having markedly smaller projectile points, cremations, the introduction of ceramics, and an emphasis on inland food processing including permanent milling stations on bedrock outcrops. In particular, the site was part of the San Luis Rey Complex, Phase II which occurs after 500 BP and the introduction of ceramic technology into the area.

The Phase I resource inventory included a search of California Historical Resources Information Systems (CHRIS) maps, record forms, and technical reports, a review of historical U.S. General Land Office (GLO) and U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) maps, a search of historical Bureau of Land Management, General Land Office (BLM-GLO) land patents, a Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) Sacred Lands Inventory fite check, and an onsite pedestrian field survey of the project area.

Phase II Field Work included a multi-step program designed to find all known archaeological resources, historic or prehistoric, in the project area. Once located, the boundaries of the sites were defined through site clearing, surface documentation and limited subsurface hand excavated STPs [Shovel Test Pits]. In addition, one hand excavated unit (1m x 1m in size) was excavated as part of this boundary assessment program. The unit was placed in the midden in order to assess the integrity of the resource, since there was evidence of historic/modern disturbance to the site area. An ethnographic study occurred simultaneously; and the results, coupled with the archaeological findings, were used to address questions and establish site significance.

The site qualified as a significant resource under both Criteria 1 and 3 of the Riverside County General Plan criteria for determining archaeological site significance. It was demonstrated that there was a high probability that the site could add important information to reconstructing the prehistory, protohistory and history of the region. For this reason, appropriate protective mitigation measures were discussed on-site with elder Vincent Ibanez and Pechanga Cultural Committee Representative and spiritual leader, Raymond Basquez. Since the significant portion of the site was located adjacent to the central parcel boundary established for the lot split, it was proposed that the site would be preserved in the boundary set aside and covered with protective fill, surrounded by the bedrock features moved from other portions of the project area. At the request of Blaine A. Womer Civil Engineering, Scientific Resource Surveys, Inc. (SRS) conducted a cultural resource survey and assessment totaling 49 acres located in the city of San Jacinto in Riverside County, California. The project area has been designated APN numbers 436-040-001, 002, and 005 and is located west of Ramona Blvd., south and east of North Sanderson Ave and north of Ranch View Ln.

The purpose of this study was to identify any and all cultural materials whether historic or prehistoric located within the boundaries of the project area. Included in this investigation were a cultural resources records search, a sacred lands file search with the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC), and an intensive pedestrian survey.

The records search for this project area was conducted by SRS employee Andrew Garrison at the Eastern Information Center located in Riverside, California. One cultural resource survey had been previously conducted within the project area yielding no cultural resources. In addition, 13 surveys had been conducted within a half-mile of the project area along with five overview surveys of this general area of Riverside County. A total of seven cultural resources have been recorded within this half-mile radius.

An intensive pedestrian survey was conducted on the property on July 11, 2011. Surface visibility was fair on the subject parcel and the entire parcel was surveyed. No significant cultural resources were identified within the boundaries of the project area.

Although no significant cultural resources were identified during this survey or the previous studies, monitoring during subsurface construction is recommended due to the proximity of nearby recorded resources. Approx 49 acres

A records search was conducted at South Central Coastal Information Center at California State University Fullerton by SRS, Inc. employee Andrew Garrison, M.A. The records search included a review of all documented archaeological (prehistoric and historic) sites within a ½ mile radius of the project area. In addition, a review was conducted of all cultural resource studies performed within the ½ mile radius. Also included in the review were the California Points of Historical Interest, the California Historical Landmarks, the California Register of Historical Resources, the National Register of Historic Places, and the California State Historic Resources Inventory. In addition, historic topographic maps from 1902 and 1941 were also reviewed in preparation for earth moving activities.

Monitoring on the APE in San Clemente was intended to provide documentation and assess the significance of cultural resources (prehistoric and historic) during subsurface rough grading and provide recommendation and mitigation measures regarding additional treatment if deemed warranted.

Over the course of eight weeks, archaeological monitors observed the grading of a parcel of land on the northwest corner of the intersection of Avenida La Pata and Avenida Vista Hermosa. The subject is roughly 15 acres in size and sits relatively level (Figures 7 and 8). Over the duration of this time monitors observed subsurface activities carried out by a variety of equipment. The machinery included a D6N bulldozer, a small bobcat for vegetation removal, three 623E belly loaders/scrapers, and one road grader.

Monitors (Jennifer Coats and Aaron Harper) observed machinery under close scrutiny while still maintaining a safe distance. Excavation of the parcel included an over excavation of the building pad down to existing bedrock. The surrounding hillsides were also graded to provide stable subsurface soils for the manufacture of an artificial drainage and the construction of retaining walls around the perimeter of the subject parcel. The archaeologists on site observed that the soil was artificial in nature and contained old tarps, pieces of concrete, and other general debris. The preliminary records search indicated resources in the nearby vicinity of the parcel while the geo-technical report indicated a lack of resources on the subject property due to the completely disturbed nature of the sediments from previous grading efforts. Upon completion of archaeological monitoring this was confirmed. Approx Size: 15 acre

BACKGROUND

Under the Federal Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, passed as part of omnibus drug legislation enacted November 18, 1988, contractors and grantees of Federal funds must certify that they will provide drug-free workplaces. At the present time, the City of Costa Mesa, as a sub-grantee of Federal funds under a variety of programs, is required to abide by this Act. The City Council has expressed its support of the national effort to eradicate drug abuse through the creation of a Substance Abuse Committee, institution of a City-wide D.A.R.E. program in all local schools and other activities in support of a drug-free community. This policy is intended to extend that effort to contractors and grantees of the City of Costa Mesa in the elimination of dangerous drugs in the workplace.

PUPPOSE

It is the purpose of this Policy to:

- 1. Clearly state the City of Costa Mesa's commitment to a drug-free society.
- 2. Set forth guidelines to ensure that public, private, and nonprofit organizations receiving funds from the City of Costa Mesa share the commitment to a drug-free workplace.

POLICY

The City Manager, under direction by the City Council, shall take the necessary steps to see that the following provisions are included in all contracts and agreements entered into by the City of Costa Mesa involving the disbursement of funds.

- 1. Contractor or Sub-grantee hereby certifies that it will provide a drug-free workplace by:
 - a. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in Contractor's and/or sub-grantee's workplace, specifically the job site or location included in this contract, and specifying the actions that will be taken against the employees for violation of such prohibition;

- b. Establishing a Drug-Free Awareness Program to inform employees about:
 - 1. The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;

 - 3. Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance programs; and
 - 4. The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
- c. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the contract be given a copy of the statement required by subparagraph A;
- d. Notifying the employee in the statement required by subparagraph 1 A that, as a condition of employment under the contract, the employee will:
 - 1. Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - 2. Notify the employer of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) days after such conviction;
- e. Notifying the City of Costa Mesa within ten (10) days after receiving notice under subparagraph 1 D 2 from an employee or otherwise receiving the actual notice of such conviction;
- f. Taking one of the following actions within thirty (30) days of receiving notice under subparagraph 1 D 2 with respect to an employee who is so convicted:
 - 1. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination; or
 - 2. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State, or local health agency, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;

- g. Making a good faith effort to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of subparagraphs 1 A through 1 F, inclusive.
- 2. Contractor and/or sub-grantee shall be deemed to be in violation of this Policy if the City of Costa Mesa determines that:
 - a. Contractor and/or sub-grantee has made a false certification under paragraph 1 above;
 - b. Contractor and/or sub-grantee has violated the certification by failing to carry out the requirements of subparagraphs 1 A through 1 G above;
 - c. Such number of employees of Contractor and/or sub-grantee have been convicted of violations of criminal drug statutes for violations occurring in the workplace as to indicate that the contractor and/or sub-grantee has failed to make a good faith effort to provide a drug-free workplace.
- 3. Should any contractor and/or sub-grantee be deemed to be in violation of this Policy pursuant to the provisions of 2 A, B, and C, a suspension, termination or debarment proceeding subject to applicable Federal, State, and local laws shall be conducted. Upon issuance of any final decision under this section requiring debarment of a contractor and/or sub-grantee, the contractor and/or sub-grantee shall be ineligible for award of any contract, agreement or grant from the City of Costa Mesa for a period specified in the decision, not to exceed five (5) years. Upon issuance of any final decision recommending against debarment of the contractor and/or sub-grantee, the contractor and/or sub-grantee shall be eligible for compensation as provided by law.
